



Religious Education Information

Wishing our Religious Education families, catechists, aides, and volunteers a joyous Christmas season!


Confirmation sponsors of students need to obtain a Certificate of Eligibility from his/her home parish. Generally, the sponsor makes an appointment to meet with his/her parish priest to obtain the Certificate. During this busy time of year, please call ahead to make an appointment to meet with a priest. The Sponsor Certificate is due Jan 10, 2021. Students who did not attend the Nov 21 retreat will attend the Jan 16, 2021 retreat at Queen of Apostles.

The registration form and fee from families, with unbaptized children who are preparing to receive the Three Sacraments of Initiation, is due **Jan. 10, 2021**

Religious Education classes will not meet Dec 20, 27, 2020 and Jan 3, 2021. At home work/projects may be assigned and due on Jan 10 when classes resume.

We respectfully ask each family with children attending inperson classes to consider quarantining (not being around those outside your immediate circle or visiting high risk areas as noted by the CDC) starting on the morning of Wednesday, January 6, 2021 through the morning of Sunday, January 10, 2020. COVID-19 symptoms can start as early as 2 days and as long as 14 days after exposure. The average time that symptoms appear is around 4 - 5 days, hence, the rationale for quarantining with your child(ren) for at least 4 days before returning to Religious Education on Jan. 10, 2021 to monitor for developing symptoms. If symptoms develop, please contact your primary Health Care Provider immediately, do not attend Religious Education class, and send a message to s.gray@queenofapostles.org. We greatly value your partnership in taking extra precautions to keep Queen of Apostles parish, school, and Religious Education communities safe and healthy.

December 27 - Feast of the Holy

Family Scripture tells us practically nothing about the first years and the boyhood of the Child Jesus. All we know are the facts of the sojourn in Egypt, the return to Nazareth, and the incidents that occurred when the twelve-

year-old boy accompanied his parents to Jerusalem. In her liturgy the Church hurries over this period of Christ's life with equal brevity. The general breakdown of the family, however, at the end of the past century and at the beginning of our own, prompted the popes, especially the far-sighted Leo XIII, to promote the observance of this feast with the hope that it might instill into Christian families something of the faithful love and the devoted attachment that characterize the family of Nazareth. The primary purpose of the Church in instituting and promoting this feast is to present the Holy Family as the model and exemplar of all Christian families.

Gospel Commentary for the Feast of the Holy Family: God's Little Home

I had a philosophy professor in college who had a great devotion to Our Blessed Mother. Whenever he would think of her or speak of her, he would always stop and tell us "God loved mothers so much that He wanted to experience having one Himself." I always loved that little thought, and all of its beautiful corollaries and consequences, paradoxical as it all might be, and it seems like the perfect thought for us as we celebrate this feast of the Holy Family.

We shouldn't lose the sense of how amazing it is for us to say that in Jesus Christ, God has a family. Christ our God is the eternal Word of the Father, exists in a perpetual now, beyond past or future, holds all things in existence by His omnipotent will, is beyond the comprehension of every being, angel of human, no matter how wise, and yet still goes home with his mom and dad at the end of the Gospel today. It seems almost absurd to consider that this little baby, who goes back to Nazareth with His parents, where He will grow, learn to speak, walk, read, write, and carry out a trade, is in fact the Master of Reality, the King of Kings, and the Lord of Lord. Yet, despite the seeming contradiction, He is.

Remembering the mystery of Christmas, we understand that Christ took on our human nature in everything but sin in order to stand in our place before the Father, and redeem in our form what we had disfigured by sin, and repair the relationship with the God whom we had rejected. We recall that He came to save us in this way to draw us to Himself gently, through methods on our level, things we could understand with our human minds. This feast of the Holy Family, though, goes further, and shows us the great love God has for even the most normal human parts of our lives, and the way in which He wants to save us.

Despite the grand scale on which the conflict between good and evil takes place, the Lord still loves our lives on their own scale. He loves the myriad little homes that cover the face of the Earth, and He loves the little communities that fills them, delighting when they choose to love one another, and calling them to repentance and healing when they do not. He loves mothers and father, and the unique roles that they play in the lives of their children. What's more, God doesn't want to save humanity as merely a conglomerate of individuals, one grand club of private members who each decide on their own to stay or leave according to the dictates of conscience. God wishes to save us as a family, as one body bound together by threads of love. He does not intend heaven to be a place of private and individualistic satisfaction of each monad, but a final perfect family without any pain, fear, suspicion, or barriers, living in peace with God and one another forever.

The medievals used to define beauty briefly as "unity in diversity." Considering the union between the things of Heaven and the things of Earth found in the perfection of Christ dwelling with His Holy Mother and St. Joseph in their little home at Nazareth, could we find anything more lovely in this world? Hardly! May the surpassing beauty of that dear family fill us with joy and hope, and move our hearts with love for God, and for the family he has given us here in the Church.
