

## Pastor's Letter

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,



The Gospel this week tells us about the parable of the Sower. Jesus with profound but straightforward language invites us to examine ourselves deeply and personally about how we are receiving the Gospel message in our lives, a task that is sometimes difficult. However, with His help, we can accomplish it. I want to emphasize that this pandemic time is an excellent opportunity to meditate and pray, particularly with this parable. These are hard times, where we feel that God is gone and has abandoned us, but the truth is that He is still here among us, and His seed must bear fruit in our lives. I pray so that all this will end soon, and that we can reunite as a family again. I know that many of you want to return to celebrating Holy Mass at regular times. Father Rampino and I also wish it, but for our safety and the safety of all of you, it is essential to take one step at a time.

Meanwhile, for this reason, I have decided to add a third mass on Sundays at 10:00 AM, starting July 19<sup>th</sup> so you will have more opportunities to participate, and practice a better social distancing as the diocese requires. For everyone's safety, we have hired a cleaning company that will oversee the disinfecting and cleaning of the church and the bathrooms after the celebration of each mass.

Also, I ask that you please continue to consider the following:

- 1- Everyone should wear masks as prevention and maintain a social distance of at least 6 feet; a family can stay together.
- 2- Our bishop still maintains the dispensation from Sunday Mass and holy days of obligation. In the same way, those over 65 and those who have health problems are encouraged to stay home.

On another note, next Monday, July 27th, our Bishop Michael Burbidge will visit us to officially install me as your pastor. It will be a solemn celebration. This week, we will provide more information on how to participate in the mass. I would have loved to have you all here, but unfortunately, it is impossible due to the current situation. However, the mass will be Livestreamed; we will also have a big screen in Hannan Hall for those who would like to follow the mass on church grounds.

Lastly, I am very grateful for your kind words of welcome, and your continued collaboration with our parish, therefore in this letter, I send you an update on our finances. (*continued on next page*)

## **Stewardship and Financial Update**

A summary letter of the U.S. Bishops' Pastoral Letter on Stewardship highlights that each one of us has received a gift and we are to use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace. The letter goes on to state that as Christian stewards we must receive God's gifts gratefully, cultivate them responsibly, share them lovingly in justice with others, and return them with increase to the Lord.

As a result of the prayers and actions of many good Christian stewards here at Queen of Apostles (QofA), our parish seems to have made it through the worst period brought on by COVID-19. In the simplest terms, many of our parishioners here placed God's priorities before their own, and generously offered their "first fruits" of time, talent, and treasury to the Lord in gratitude for His many blessings and to further our apostolic mission during this very difficult time.

One question I have been asked by a few parishioners since my arrival here on June 25<sup>th</sup> is about my concern with the financial situation here at QofA. Let me be succinct: we are fine at the moment. This is the result of many factors.

Since you will always find me both transparent and clear about our financial situation, I wish to highlight the reasons why we have come through this unprecedented period both in the black and poised to move forward:

- **The QofA Emergency Fund:** Under the leadership of Father Juan, my predecessor, we set-up an emergency fund that would provide additional resources for both the poor and the church facilities. Almost \$80,000 was raised. The generosity of the QofA parishioners in this effort will be rewarded beyond this life.
- **Volunteers:** An incredible amount of time and effort has been donated by talented craftsman and laborers on our Adoration Chapel, grounds, buildings, and throughout our physical plant. QofA was able to reduce our expenses by tens of thousands of dollars because both labor and material were provided by our parishioners. Again, Our Father, who sees all what they quietly did for our parish, will reward them.
- **Paycheck Protection Plan (PPP):** Under the leadership of Father Juan and guidance from the Diocese, we applied and received a \$313,000 PPP loan. Our goal is to use all these dollars to pay church and school staff salaries, and utilities. If successful, this loan will be converted to a grant.
- **Faith Direct:** Since mid-March, the number of parishioners using Faith Direct has increased by 45%. The willingness of our parishioners to convert from paper offertory envelopes to Faith Direct's electronic service kept us from suffering a financial catastrophe since there were no in-person Masses for almost 12 weeks. If you have not yet gone online to utilize Faith Direct, I ask you to consider doing so at <https://membership.faithdirect.net/>

Going forward, there will be a brief financial update in all of my weekly letters to you. These updates will cover other items in the upcoming weeks such as the status of our school and the Capital Campaign. On June 30<sup>th</sup>, we completed the 2019-2020 Fiscal Year. Once the audit is complete and the books are closed out, we will publish and deliver to you a full financial report.

In closing, I am very pleased to report that under Fr. Juan and the Disciples, and as a result of the above-noted activities, the QofA Church outperformed the FY 2019-2020 budget, and it appears the QofA School will be very close to meeting its budget! I am so impressed with the parishioners here at QofA. Without a doubt, you exemplify the good stewards described in the U.S. Bishops' Pastoral Letter on Stewardship. I am so blessed to be here.

More to come in the future! You are always in my prayers, and may the Lord bless you always.


The Associates of St. John Bosco invites rising college freshmen to attend a College Night at one of the following parishes:

## GOSPEL REFLECTION

### 16th Sunday in Ordinary Time: Justice and Grace

"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied." This beatitude might well in some ways be considered the beatitude of our times. So often now, we hear calls for justice and right action. For so many, their Christian faith is precisely their principle of action, the motivating engine behind movements for reform in the Church and in the secular world. Yet Christ today in our Gospel tells His servants that they are not to rush out into the field of the world to pull up the weeds in one fell swoop. Why this seeming contradiction? We know that our God is a God of justice, so why does He seem to hold back those who hunger and thirst for righteousness?

The truth is that the Lord does, of course, desire perfect justice. He simply wants us to understand and accept that He will be the one to bring it about in the end. It is good for us to remember that while Christ calls us to reform our own lives and to work for the good of our neighbor, He does not ask us to create a paradise on Earth. He simply asks us to follow Him and treat our neighbor with His love.

So long as we imperfect creatures are the ones doing the work, we simply will not create perfect justice anywhere. We have to wait for heaven itself before we experience utopia. If we think that we must accomplish perfect justice on earth, our pursuit of it will become desperate and loveless, ideological and unstable. If we think that we can accomplish perfect justice on earth, our efforts will become distorted by pride, blind to our own sins and failing, and closed to God's grace.

Yet we do not have to worry about whether perfect justice will come about or not. At the end of the parable, Christ does separate the fully grown weeds and wheat, the bad souls and the good, in order to give to each what their lives have deserved. In heaven, He will heal all the wounds that time could not, and inaugurate the age of perfection. This hope in the inevitable victory of grace lets us do our good work here on earth with joy, with vigor, and with peace of heart. If we remain faithful to the task of daily righteousness, the Lord will bring about, through that simple fidelity, the greater things for which we hope.
